

The RSPB encourage us to feed wild birds, which are threatened by reduced natural resources. They estimate that 27 million birds are killed annually in the British Isles by cats. A blackbird suffered the same fate the following day. The RSPB recommend cat owners to fit their pets with collars and a bell.

When the bin men collect the green bins, I hear loads of glass being tipped into the dustcart. Deposited in our bottle banks, this would be beneficial directly to Parish Council, and the village.

ELECTIONS - 2nd MAY 2019

There were no Parish Council elections held on 2nd May 2019 due to insufficient nominations. Therefore the people who stood were uncontested and automatically elected. We welcome back again - Lesley Sparrow, Roger Swift, Louis de Soissons, Louise Marriner, Tish Peal and Graham McCabe.

Elections were held on 2nd May for District Elections and the persons nominated will be Sue Arnold as a Conservative Party Candidate and Nigel Pearce as a Liberal Democrat. We look forward to the outcome.

SOUTHREPPS COMMONS TRUST

It has taken nearly 3 years to transfer the Commons from the Parish Council to Norfolk Wildlife Trust and we are just waiting for confirmation from the Land Registry that this has now been completed.

WELLSPRING ROAD

The road is collapsing and it is important that the "CLOSED ROAD" signage is NOT MOVED to one side – this is vital to stop an accident. You could be fined up to £1,000 for this. Please think of others who may utilise the road and do not appreciate that it is being undermined.

It could cause a cyclist or motorcycle to have a truly nasty accident.

We understand that it is tedious but the road has had to be closed whilst the situation is monitored and assessments made.

COMMUNITY LITTER PICK

The Council would like to thank the 20 plus volunteers who turned out on a chilly morning to complete this yearly initiative. Thanks to every one of you – it really is a fantastic achievement.

Our appreciation to the Southrepps Support Scheme for organising and co-ordinating this.

DOG FOULING

PLEASE PLEASE pick up after your dog IT IS AN OFFENCE not to and you can be heavily fined. If you see this happening and know who it is let NNDC Environmental Team know. Offer a dog bag to help – the person may have forgotten. Do we need any more dog bins??

VILLAGE HALL

Over the past year the Parish Council has worked alongside the Village Hall Committee in a proactive way to ensure the longevity of the Village Hall. We have supported the installation of new heating together with a new concrete pad/walkway. The primary reason for this was to ensure safety for our disabled hirers and to improve the overall appearance of the area. The cost of this work amounted to £5,200 for the access and £3,200 for the heating improvements. We are sure that you will agree that your money has been well spent for the benefit of our residents and users.

SOU02 - VICTORY HOUSING -LONG LANE

There is no update on this at the present time however, we are aware that it may be reapplied for in due course.

RECREATION GROUND AND CAR PARK

The work at the recreation ground was finally completed and due to the original contractor walking away and the invoice rescinded there was an excess of funds. These funds were returned to the donators in order to keep a clear audit trail. We have received a tree report to inform the Council of any work which may need addressing over the coming months/years.

Changing facilities have recently been installed alongside the Village Hall and the unit is being painted.

SPEEDWATCH

We are STILL seeking more members to join the team otherwise this community initiative may fold. This is a deterrent against speeding within your village – please come forward and help. Pick up that phone or email us.

SAM2 - FLASHING SPEED SIGN

The SAM Team undertake an amazing job moving the unit and we are going to supply regular updates from the data unit on the Parish Council website for all to view.

OTHER INFORMATION

A grit bin has been provided to Lower Southrepps at the junction of Bramble Lane to help on frosty mornings.

ALLOTMENTS

These are currently all rented but if you would like to be placed onto the waiting list please let us know.

WHITE VILLAGE ENTRANCE GATES

In our quest to try and slow the traffic down within the centre of the village the Parish Council applied for funding towards the White Gate initiative via the NCC Parish Partnership Scheme. We have been successful and are hoping to have these up and installed by the Highways Team in due

course. The total cost of this work is £4,000 approx. We hope that it will have the desired outcome.

Glass Bottle Banks -PUT YOUR EMPTY GLASS JARS/BOTTLES IN HERE!!

It may take a bit more effort but every bottle counts towards income to your community please contribute.

A reclaim for approximately £620 has been made for the glass recycling units within Southrepps. Thank you for each and everyone of you for every bottle – they all count and add up. Please keep collecting them and making the effort to put them in the bottle bank bins – it does make a difference to your community.

Notes from a Common Man

It is with mixed emotions that I set about penning my final "Notes"; it will be the fortieth. I am not predicting a rapid loss of grip on my perch, but merely drawing attention to last month's commendably seamless transition of Southrepps Commons from our Parish Council to Norfolk Wildlife Trust. This remarkable accomplishment concludes a three year process somewhat more successfully than another three-year epic grind that I can think of. And like the parallel process, we haven't arrived at the end but only a new beginning; one door closes and another opens.

Just over three years ago, our Parish Council recognised a perfect storm was brewing, were it not to address three problems with The Commons: 1) the falling numbers and increasing ages of Volunteers prepared to put in the winter hours needed to look after the place; 2) the boardwalk (a timber structure sitting in a bog!) would soon need replacing for a cost way above what our village could afford; and 3) the principal funding was a Countryside Stewardship grant which expired in 2018 and was unlikely to be renewed.

So why not just leave the place alone and let nature take its course? Expressions of shock and horror aside, the Council would be breaking the law, because it is a Site of Special Scientific Interest and part of a Special Area of Conservation, making it just about as legally protected as a Bacton sand martin. And for good reason, with over four hundred plant species and rising (surveying is exhaustive and on-going), water voles, otters, and a rare place where you can still see glow worms, Southrepps is extremely lucky to have the five sites which collectively make up The Commons.

Cue, Norfolk Wildlife Trust; whilst not large, Southrepps wouldn't be their smallest reserve, which singular honour goes to one very elderly and venerable Hawthorn tree at Hethel, south of Norwich. (The protected area is a whopping 0.025 hectares, making it the smallest County Wildlife Trust reserve in the country!) Invitations were sent, NWT came, and Southrepps Commons Trust enjoyed well-deserved plaudits for an exemplary site. All credit to our loyal Volunteers for showing what

can be achieved when a group of like-minded people pull together.

For NWT to take on The Commons, with



appropriate covenants, was a lifeline which the Parish Council sensibly grabbed. But, having to wind-up Southrepps Commons Trust comes very hard, which is why I admit writing with mixed emotions. The Trust grew out of a disparate group of residents who managed The Commons from 1990 until we turned it into a Registered Charity in 2005. Of the original members from those early days, I only know two who still live in the village, Ivan Bailey and Ian Cashmore, whilst of the others, I am proud to say that I helped build Jubilee Boardwalk with Ed Potter, Vic Purdy and John Daniels. Later on I built the extension to Scouts' Pond with its dipping platform, and our information kiosk at the car park. I was involved for eighteen years, getting to know some wonderful people without whom the project would have failed, leaving our village so much the poorer.

Southrepps Commons Trust was special, a fact recognised in awards from "Campaign to Protect Rural England", "Norfolk County Biodiversity Group", NNDC Environment Awards and The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

We worked for the Parish Council but they left us to our own devices and their trust was not misplaced. We developed techniques involving drag-sheets, a huge, bespoke hand-cart and ultimately a petrol winch.

Our mower is the mother of all such machines and a beast to handle. But our strongest, largest, most valuable and all-round impressive resource is the human one, the Volunteers. When I tell anyone involved in voluntary work that we routinely ran working parties of sixteen to twenty people on Sunday mornings throughout autumn and winter, they are very impressed. Despite my dire predictions, numbers have picked up; we call it the 'Pilates Effect', and if you don't know why, look into The Vernon Arms on a Friday morning. If the group needed a motto it would be written around "motivation" and "friendship".

So, what for the future? Again our Volunteers deserve much credit for their positive attitude to change and determination to make it work. NWT makes reassuring noises and calls us a "Dependent Volunteer Group", which means we carry on much as before. Sadly, our superb web-site has to go, although its glorious gallery has transferred to NWT, and we have started a new blog to replace the popular previous one: see links from Parish Council and



NWT.

All in all, the Parish Council has one less thing to worry about, the dog-walkers can stride out (taking their little presents with them!), the botanists are happy, and we're getting The Pit returned to its land-mark status. The old order changeth but good people are running the new. Southrepps Commons Trust bows out gracefully with heads held high.



ELECTIONS

By the time you read this the District Elections will have taken place. It is my hope that I will be elected once more to represent Roughton Ward and I would like to thank all who supported me. If not reelected my best wishes to Nigel.

Best wishes too to the new Southrepps Parish Council. This is an interesting role though not always an easy one.

An amendment on my last report. The District Council expenditure on refurbishment of the many loos should have read £600,000. It is so important our loos are fit for purpose. We live in a holiday area and it is vital our loos give a good impression.

The new Local Plan is taking shape and public consultations will shortly be taking place. Firstly these will concentrate on the urban areas.

The Tennis Hub and Sports Centre is taking shape in Cromer.

The expected funding from the Lawn Tennis Association was unfortunately not forthcoming but the Council are hopeful of finding funds from other sources.

The Splash in Sheringham- anyone driving past the site will see that work has commenced. It is intended that the old Splash will remain in use until the new one is ready.

Sandscaping scheme at Bacton

is now under way. The original initiative for this was to protect the gas site but the Council has committed funds to enable more sand to be placed in order to protect the adjacent villages of Bacton and Walcott. Unfortunately in spite of consultation with the RSPB, who had full knowledge of what was proposed, problems arose over the netting being placed on the cliffs and the impact this could cause on nesting sites for sand martins. Most of the netting has now been removed, it is necessary to net the lower part of the cliff as once the sand is in place this area will be covered in sand. This scheme has been five years in the planning, and is a ground breaking scheme for the UK.

The Deep history coast project is rapidly coming to fruition- there is a lot of information on The Council's web site. The launch of the trail of this exciting project will be advertised very shortly.

The Big Society continues to fund local projects and Southrepps has recently benefited from a grant to upgrade the heating in the village hall.

The District now has Six Blue Flag beaches, more than any other district

We also have four green flags for our parks.

in the country.

Lastly an update (or rather a no update) on the land in Long Lane. Up to press no new application has been received, though it is expected one will be forthcoming eventually, hopefully a better designed one.

The Southrepps Great War Project

Following on from the last edition of the Mardler we thought you might like to know how the project to name all those from Southrepps who were involved in the Great War is progressing.

We have researched and included all persons who were born in the village and/or lived in the village and who contributed to the War effort.

One of the major problems encountered has been the loss of about 60% of the soldiers' records during the 1940 London Blitz, however we have managed to construct small 'biographies' for each of the individuals including their lives outside military life.

So what have we established so far -

24 men from the village lost their lives and are remembered at St James' Church.

Another 13 men with a village connection were also killed and are remembered elsewhere.

We may imagine that all the men lost their lives in France and Belgium but that assumption is incorrect. 23 of the 37 men actually died on the battlefields of France and Belgium. The battlefields of the Great War also encompassed the eastern Mediterranean and involved the armies of the Ottoman Empire where 4 men died in Turkey, 3 at sea on torpedoed troopships, 2 in Palestine and 1 in Bulgaria.


The remaining men died at sea near the UK (2) or in England of their injuries or sickness (2).

The survivors so far number 116 and we have another 20 names who we believe served in the war but we know little more than that at present.

Within the survivors group we know of 5 women who served with the Red Cross in their Voluntary Aid Detachment.

7 men were captured by the enemy and became prisoners of war - 3 men were held in German camps, 2 in Bulgarian camps and 2 in Turkish camps.

Conditions in these camps were not good, food was in short supply and medical help was minimal. As a result one of the Bulgarian PoW's died as well as the two Turkish PoW's. Their deaths are included in the figures above.



You might expect that most of the men would have enlisted in the Norfolk Regiment but that only applies to about 40% of them. The rest were serving in other county regiments and some even joined Scottish regiments. Quite a number of them joined the Royal Navy and the Royal Flying Corps. Many of the older men were recruited by the Labour Corps.

The most common surname that crops up in the list of soldiers is Hewitt, we have found 16 of them.

The family who were most involved probably goes to the Claxton's – they produced 4 soldiers and a Red Cross VAD – all survived.

A number of the men were commended for acts of bravery, the Military Medal being the most common award. When you consider that the population of the village at the outbreak of war included about 800 men, women and children then the effect upon the community must have been quite dramatic. The soldiers didn't all depart at the same time but even so the village would have been a different place.

So what will we do with all the information gathered to date? A book would probably have limited appeal and would be expensive to publish so we are looking to put the information online so it can be disseminated to a larger audience.

However before that happens we are planning to have a display at the village fair on 27th July so do come along and see what we've found out about the Southrepps Boys.

It is with a heavy heart that I have to tell you that Alyson died on 11 March 2019. Alyson was admitted to the N & N hospital on 3 March and shortly after suffered a massive stroke from which she never regained consciousness.

Alyson had been diagnosed with Myeloma two years ago, a condition which she mainly kept to herself. A popular member of our community, she took part in everything the village had to offer; a staunch volunteer for LAMS (life after multiple sclerosis), she looked forward to Mondays at the village hall to help out; she enjoyed talking to the patients who became friends. A crowded church paid tribute to Alyson's life, which was certainly exciting and adventurous. A mother of three and stepmother of two, with nine grandchildren in all. In the 1970's she became a travel director, taking groups of all sizes all over the world. In 1979 she was a pioneer taking a small group through Europe, Russia and China, where foreigners were mostly unseen by the Chinese at that time. She continued this work until Colin retired, when they went to live in France, giving them the opportunity to indulge in their love of skiing (Colin described her skiing style as 'beautiful').

After many years they returned to the UK and decided to come to Norfolk where Colin was born. Alyson loved Norfolk and Southrepps, where she felt at home, a place to put down roots and enjoy her beloved dogs. She will be sorely missed by all who knew her. A beautiful lady.

She shared her skills with youngsters at a craft club at the village school. She was also a founder member of the Southrepps Chorale.

Her funeral was held at St James on 18th March and her ashes were interred in the graveyard there on 15th April.

When not investigating their own curiosities, the children



Many North Norfolk Bowls Clubs have already closed and unless we get some support from Southrepps Village Community it looks as if we will go the same way.




